NOTES

- *1 Too high to count, a noisy flyover composed of several flocks of Cackling geese flew from the NW. to the SE.
- *2 In addition to the Canada goose total were two flocks of 50 and 100, which were also too high to count.
- *3 One early flyover from N. to S, then possibly the same one hunting the main lagoon.
- *4 Two adults flew in from the W. and landed on the lagoon, then a sub-adult and an adult flyover from W. to E.
- *5 One adult female perched early on metal posts, just SE. of the main entrance, then soared up and departed.
- *6 One standing in a nest vocalizing, as a second sharpie flew from the same general area.
- *7 One adult male (by size) was seen by pond team and a SY juvenile flying E. to W. over NW. forest, seen by all.
- *8 One vagrant adult in W. meadows, one SW. adult on territory and both NW. adults in and above NW. forest.
- *9 One male pheasant seen flying from the wet meadows W, just N. of interior service gate; two others heard.
- *10 One flew out of the site N. to S., over the S. power line trail, into a row of conifers and was observed there.
- *11 Audubon's 37, Myrtles 22

MORE NOTES

No evidence of recent owls was observed in, or below the pine trees at Anderson Park.
