NOTES

- *1 One was seen on the path, just N. of the pair of N. cells, while the second was seen in the W. cell of the pair.
- *2 The harrier was a fly through from the SE. to the NW. and appeared to be an adult female, but not confirmed.
- *3 One SW. resident adult on territory; both NW. adults on territory, one on snag NW. of Lagoon and one flying.
- *4 A male perched on pole above kestrel box early in the count, then later on the same pole/snag, eating prey.
- *5 Both flying together were seen by both teams, flying near the NE. cell, circling out and over the W. meadow.
- *6 All were seen by the ponds team and all were determined to be of the Audubon's race.

MORE NOTES

No evidence of recent pellets and no owls seen in the Anderson Park pines. Loss of adjacent habitat suspected. Recent sightings of a Barn Owl on the site south fence railing may indicate possible roosting in off site conifers.
